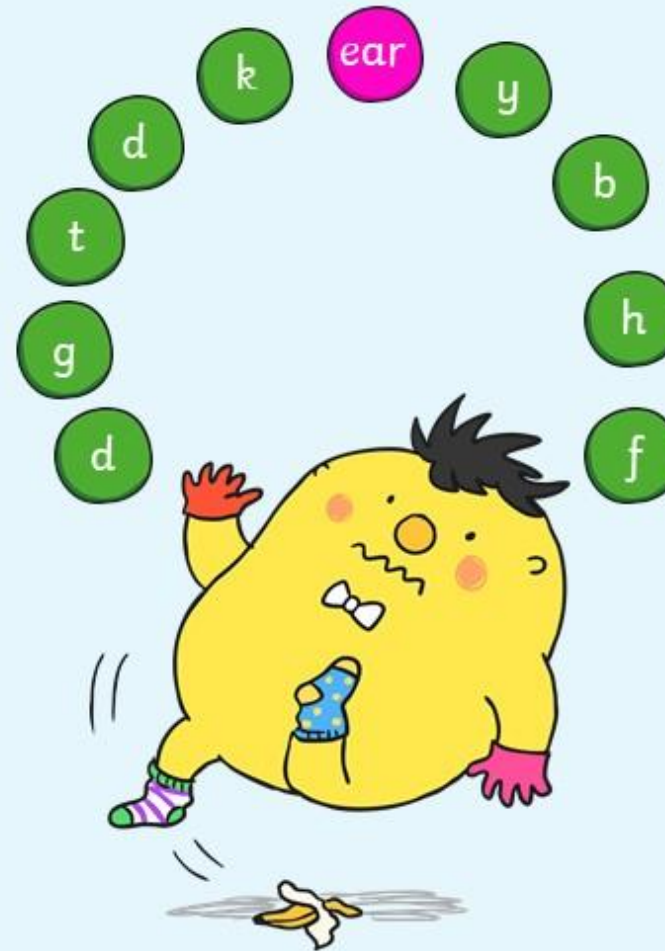
	Activity	Guidance for Parents

Which do you prefer? Why?	Discussion activity to encourage your child to talk through their ideas
3	The ear sound Let's look at the ear sound (page 2) How many words can you think of? Can you write them down too?	Please continue to focus on the correct spelling of Year 1 common exception words in addition to this activity.
4	Reading Comprehension Read the beginning of the poem Bed in Summer by Robert Louis Stevenson (page 3) and answer the questions. <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. When does the child in this poem have to get up in the winter?2. Find 8 words in the poem that rhyme.3. What does the child in the poem hear when going to bed in summer?4. Do you think the child in the poem prefers going to bed in summer or winter? Why?	Your child should be able to read the given text independently.
